Abbot Cletus Meagher Announces Retirement

In accordance with the law proper to the American-Cassinese Congregation of Benedictine Monks, which stipulates seventy-five years as the retirement age of abbots, the Right Reverend Cletus D. Meagher, O.S.B., the ninth abbot of Saint Bernard Abbey in Cullman, Alabama, who turns seventy-five in 2019, announces his impending retirement from the office of abbot.

Abbot Cletus's retirement from the abbatial office will take effect upon the election of his successor, the tenth abbot of St. Bernard Abbey, which will be

held the week of July 22, 2019. Abbot President Elias Lorenzo, O.S.B., president of the American-Cassinese Congregation of Benedictine Monks, will preside over the election process.

Abbot Cletus was born in Cleveland, Tennessee, in 1944, and attended high school and college at St. Bernard, studying as a candidate for the abbey. He entered monastic life in 1964, professing simple vows on July 4, 1965. He studied theology at St. Bede Abbey in Peru, Illinois, and at the University of St. Louis in St. Louis, Missouri. He was

Fr. Bede Marcy has accepted the challenge of taking over dining services at St. Bernard Abbey starting in June. For the past eight years, St. Bernard's dining hall has been operated by Flik Independent School Dining Services. However, this contract comes to a close on May 31st of this year.

Knowing that the current contract with Flik would be coming to an end in May, Abbot Cletus Meagher, approached Fr. Bede this past Fall to ask if he would be willing to consider taking over the position of dining hall manager. "Honestly, I was shocked by his response," said Abbot Cletus, "I really thought that he would be more hesitant to take on such an enormous task." In fact, Fr. Bede gave an enthusiastic "Yes".


Fr. Bede has been cooking since he was a young boy and has had a passion for it ever since. His dad said that he cooked his first meal for the family when he was only ten years old – sweet and sour

chicken with sticky rice. "We couldn't believe it. He kicked us out of the kitchen! And did everything from scratch. This was long before the days of YouTube videos." Since coming to the monastery, Fr. Bede has regularly prepared meals for the monastic community and is always trying to get them to eat new things. Over the past couple of years, he has focused on mastering Korean cuisine to the delight of our many international boarding students. He has even been featured on Maangchi's Korean YouTube cooking channel. One monk commented, "Fr. Bede really seems to love the art of cooking - he is always making things from scratch, from fresh cheese to kimchi, to breads and pastas." Despite his eager response, Abbot Cletus wisely asked that Fr. Bede ponder the challenge before giving his final answer. In fact, Abbot Cletus asked twice more if Fr. Bede was sure about the appointment

and each time was met with an enthusiastic "Absolutely!". In the Spring of this year, Abbot Cletus announced to both the monastic community and the larger Saint Bernard community that Fr. Bede would be the new Executive Chef of the Saint Bernard Dining Hall.

Fr. Bede will take a break from his chaplain services and day to day teaching in the classroom to prepare three hot meals daily for the monastic community, students, faculty, and staff, as well as taking care of retreat groups and various catered events. Fr. Bede said he is excited to serve and teach and minister in this new way. Jesus did not need a classroom in which to teach. But he used images from farming and food constantly in his teaching because he knows that we hunger and thirst ultimately we hunger and thirst for God. What a great way to share the Gospel and serve the community!"

"We appreciate everything Flik has done for St. Bernard," Fr. Bede said. "Chef Thomas has been a great source of encouragement and very helpful in making sure the transition goes smoothly. I am happy to know that Chef Thomas has received a wonderful job offer in Montgomery which will allow him more quality time with his wife and twin boys." We all look forward to seeing what Fr. Bede and his team have on the menu for this coming year!

Three Men Enter Novitiate

At First Vespers of the Solemnity of the Passing of Saint Benedict, Prior Leo Borelli, O.S.B., novice master and formation director, presented Saint Bernard's three postulants - Father Matthew Simmons, Anthony Visintainer, and Christian Peterson - to Abbot Cletus for reception into the novitiate. Before the monastic community, the abbot asked the three postulants "What do you seek?" Together, they answered: "The mercy of God and fellowship in this community." Then, each was invested with the monastic scapular over his tunic and received his new religious name. Father Matthew is now known as Father Isaac, Anthony as Brother Lazarus, and Christian as Brother Andrew.

The new novices now begin the year-long novitiate of work, prayer, study, and formation that precedes simple profession of vows.

St. Bernard Monks Prepare to Elect Abbot

This year Abbot Cletus D.

Meagher, OSB, who has served as abbot of St. Bernard Abbey since 1995, will turn 75 and is required by the law of the American-Cassinese Congregation of Benedictine Monasteries, to which St. Bernard belongs, to resign from office. At that point, the monks of St. Bernard will hold an election for a new abbot, which has been scheduled to begin July 22, 2019. Completion of the election process can take anywhere from one to several days.

The election of an abbot is an important event in the life of a monastic community and is not to be approached cayalierly.

Consequently, the monks of St. Bernard have already begun preparing for this momentous event, as far back as July of last year, when Fr. Michael Skrocki, a priest of the Eparchy of Newton, MA, and a canon lawyer, delivered two conferences to the community, one on the election of an abbot in the Rule of St. Benedict and another on the election of an abbot according to the Code of Canon Law. More recently, on March 24 and 25 of this year. Abbot Placid Solari, OSB, of Belmont Abbey in North Carolina, came and gave a series of three conferences on the role of the abbot.

The monks, however, have been

(Continued from page 1) subsequently ordained to the priesthood on May 24, 1971. In the years before his election as abbot on May 8, 1995, Abbot Cletus served in a variety of roles, including prior, subprior, novice master, procurator, farm manager, and pastor of Sacred Heart Church in Cullman.

Abbot Cletus takes this opportunity to give thanks to Almighty God for sustaining him in nearly a quarter century of service to the monastic community as abbot, and to express his gratitude for the immeasurable support he received from the monks, and countless friends and benefactors of the abbey; he joins the monastic community in asking for your prayers as they begin

the process of discernment leading up to the election of a new abbot. Though he is grateful for the many years of service to the monastic community as abbot, Abbot Cletus states, "I look forward to the election of the new abbot and transitioning into a new role of service for the community –whatever that might be."

St. Bernard Abbey is a monastery of Benedictine monks founded in 1891 and is the home of St. Bernard Preparatory School, the Ave Maria Grotto, and St. Bernard Retreat and Conference Center. doing more than listening to conferences in preparation for the election. Most importantly, they have been praying for the guidance of the Holt Spirit. One way that they have been doing this is by praying the Rosary together for the intention of the election on the Wednesdays of Lent. A series of community meetings for discussion of topics related to the choosing of an abbot are also scheduled for the first week of July. Meanwhile, the public reading of books and articles relating to the abbot and monastic leadership is being done at the monks' supper each evening. Such "Table Reading" ordinarily accompanies the monks' evening meal throughout the year, but the theme of the reading is currently focused on topics relating to the election.

In contrast to secular politics, there is no "campaign season" leading up to the election of an abbot. In fact, the monks are forbidden to campaign for the office of abbot. There are no "candidates" until the election actually begins, as all the monks of the abbey who are solemnly professed (i.e. have made a lifetime commitment to the monastery) are on the ballot. Nonetheless, there are certain requirements for the office of abbot spelled out in the proper law of the Congregation, namely: "In order to be validly elected to the office of abbot it is required that a monk be: (1) at least thirty years of age; (2) solemnly professed for at least seven years; (3) an ordained priest; (4) a member of the Congregation" (Constitutions of the American-Cassinese Congregation, 13).

The Abbot President of the Congregation, Abbot Elias Lorenzo, OSB, will preside over the election.

Once a monk has received the requisite number of votes, the Abbot President will ask him if he accepts the election; he is free to reject the election (i.e. refuse the office) if he sees fit. If he accepts, then the Abbot President confirms the election, and the abbot-elect assumes the office immediately. Within three months of the election, the new abbot is blessed in a grand ceremony. If the monk chosen refuses the election, then the community must begin the election process all over again. This may be done at once or at a later date (usually within a month).

The monks of St. Bernard ask all their friends and associates to join them in praying for the guidance of the Holy Spirit in the election of the next abbot of St. Bernard, FIAT VOLUNTAS DE!!

Three Monks Profess Simple Vows March 21

During Mass of the Solemnity of the Passing of Saint Benedict on Thursday, March 21, in the presence of Abbot Cletus, the monastic community, and many family members and friends, three novices made their simple profession of monastic vows, becoming the newest junior monks of Saint Bernard Abbev.

After being questioned by the abbot about their resolve to embrace a vowed monastic life, each novice read his profession document aloud. Then, together with two monks chosen by the novice as witnesses, each signed the document upon the altar. With arms extended, the

newly-professed monks sang the ancient prayer "Suscipe Me Domine" ("Uphold me O Lord according to your promise and I will live; do not let my hope in you be in vain") from Psalm 119. Each was clothed by the abbot in the monastic hood, a sign of being a professed monk, and finally received the fraternal embrace from all of the other professed monks.

Brother Charles Manning and Brother Benedict Dyar served as lectors and Deacon Pete Nassetta assisted the abbot. The music was led by the monastic schola, under the direction of Father Joel Martin, with Brother Peter Le accompanying as organist.

Brother Benedict Dyar and Brother Marion Sanchez served as witnesses for Brother Simeon, Prior Leo Borelli and Father Joel Martin for Brother Paul, and Father Marcus Voss and Father Bernard Denson for Brother Cassian. Following the Mass, there was a festive luncheon served in the student dining hall.

Monastic formation consists of three phases: a six-month period of initial monastic orientation known as the postulancy, a year of intense formation called the novitiate, and finally three years of simply—or temporarily—professed vows referred to as the juniorate. At the conclusion of these three years, the junior monk may profess solemn - or final - vows, becoming a monk for life.



Summer Appeal Underway at St. Bernard

With the coming of the summer, St. Bernard is making plans to move forward on a project that has been under study for the past several years. With the help of the Tennessee Valley Authority, the study focused on the use of LED lights for the improvement of campus life and for savings on the utility budget.

Director of Development, Fr. Marcus Voss said, "We made the decision two years ago to have a trial run for this project. We replaced the incandescent lights with LED lights in the Fazi-Richard Athletic Center. As it turned out, the lighting for the gym was much brighter and we had a 40% savings on our utility bill. Then, last year, an independent contractor evaluated the placement of LED lights for the campus overall. Their study showed that, not only would lighting greatly improve at every level, but there would be a \$50,000 savings on the annual budget."

"Having done the studies, our plan this summer is to move ahead with the project of installing LED lights throughout the St. Bernard campus," Fr. Marcus continued. "This is an ambitious goal and we are dedicating our 22nd Annual Summer Appeal to this effort. With the help of our alumni and benefactors, I know we'll get the job done."

"Over the years, the summer appeal has provided many significant improvements at St. Bernard," Fr. Marcus added. "Our goal is to make forward progress on this year's project. I will be most grateful for the support we'll receive toward reaching our goal."

Dyron Powell (SBP '99) and Zac Wood New Owners of The All Steak

Cullman's landmark restaurant, The All Steak, was recently purchased by its 5th generation of owners - Dyron Powell (SBP '99) and Zac Woods of Cullman.

The All Steak restaurant in Cullman is described by the Birmingham News as "the place where half of Cullman comes to talk about politics and football." The popular eatery first opened to 1934 when it was founded in Pulaski, Tennessee by Millard Buchhmann. The original name was to have been "All Steak Hamburgers," but when the sign was made, Millard did not have the money to add the word "Hamburgers."

In 1938, he moved the business to Cullman selling the restaurant to Ewing and Lucille Wallace in 1946. The Wallace family operated from that time until 1962 when a fire forced the restaurant to close. The establishment reopened in 1963 and continued under the Wallace family until 1977 when it was sold to Charlie and Paula Dobson. In 1998, the restaurant changed locations and moved to the top of the Cullman Savings Bank building. There it stayed until 2006 when the new owner, Matt Heim, moved to the corner of third avenue and fourth street southeast.

When The All Steak came available this year, Dyron Powell, who graduated from St. Bernard Preparatory School in 1991, joined with Zac Woods to become its new owners. Dyron and his wife, Sonya, are the proud owners of highly successful Dyron's Lowcountry Restaurant in Birmingham, which is rated as one of the top restaurants in Mountain Brook.

Under their new ownership and direction, the All Steak will give even greater emphasis to its long tradition of exceptional food, including excellent steaks, home-grown vegetables and fine seafood, in an atmosphere that includes white table clothes and superb service. The menu will also include their signature orange rolls, which are said to be "world famous" and are served hot with each meal. The orange rolls are so popular, it's not unusual for patrons to pick up a dozen (or two) of the rolls to go, either already made or packaged to cook at home.

Dyron and Sonya make their home in Cullman and have their two children, Ethan and Emma, enrolled at St. Bernard Prep School. Woods and his wife Amy have four children. Amy is the niece of James Earl Edge (C '62) of Cullman.
