Thirty Days of Thanks and Giving Exceeds Goal

All items requested through this project have undergone an approval process. Hooper said, "Every item that a teacher, nurse, or librarian will purchase with our donors' gifts as part of this program has been reviewed and determined to be an actual need by our school leadership. We were very intentional in making sure every dollar a donor gives will be used on classroom needs by our teachers.


Items approved through this grant program include math kits and graphing calculators, copies of novels and textbooks for several classes, Chromebook charging carts, science lab balances and safety aprons, geography map making software, new sheet sets for the nurses' office, band chairs and instruments, photography equipment for journalism, costumes for the spring drama production, and Wall Street Journal subscriptions to supplement economics classes.

Eighty-four donors made gifts totaling \$27,789, 111% of our goal. This generous

support will have immediate, transformative impact for St. Bernard as every single dollar raised goes directly to fund school grants for our teachers, nurses' office, and

Hooper stated St. Bernard can now provide for every item on teachers', nurses', and librarian's wish lists, and then some. "Because friends answered our call and gave so generously, grants will be awarded for approximately \$1,200 each -- \$200 more than anticipated!

'On behalf of Abbot Marcus, Fr. Joel, and the entire administration, faculty, staff, and students of SBP, thanks you for giving, thank you for supporting us, and most of all, thank you for loving St. Bernard. Your philanthropy has made a true difference here at SBP," concluded Hooper.

Born and raised in Cullman, AL, the son of Joe and Catherine Voss Attended St. Bernard Prep School 1957-60 and graduated from Cullman High School in 1961. Enrolled at St.

Bernard College 1961-66 graduating summa cum laude with a BA degree in Philosophy and a minor in Business Administration. Earned a Masters of Divinity from St. Louis University in 1970 and a Masters in Spirituality from Creighton University in 1981 Ordained to the priesthood 1971 and from 1971-2019 served in the weekend ministry throughout Alabama. Was the Abbey Choir Master 1971-1991 and published a four-volume "Book of Hours" for use in the monastic choir. Has been a member of the Senior Council since 1971. Appointed Sub-Prior 1977-82. Served as registrar of St. Bernard College/Southern Benedictine College 1970-78 and was Campus Minister in 1979. Appointed Director of the Abbey Formation Program 1979-86 and also served as the Business manager of St. Bernard Abbey 1995-2008. Has served as a Visitator for the American Cassinese Congregation since 1988. Assigned as the Headmaster of St. Bernard Prep School 1986-92, President 1992-2011 and Development Director 1992-2019. In 2019 elected the 10th Abbot of St. Bernard Abbey.

Abbot Cletus D. Meagher, O.S.B.

The fifth of six children of Oscar A. and Mildred (Sommers) Meagher born November 15, 1944 in Cleveland, Tennessee. Primary school education was under the tutelage of the Nashville Dominicans at Notre Dame Grammar School in Chattanooga, TN. In 1958 entered St. Bernard Preparatory Seminary and graduated in 1962 – last graduation class of St. Bernard Prep until re-establishment in 1984 continued seminary studies at St Bernard College Seminary 1962-1964;

entered St. Bernard Abbey in 1964 as novice and professed vows in 1965; resumed college studies, graduating in 1967 with a Bachelor of Arts in Philosophy and minors in Psychology and English. Completed theological studies with a Masters of Divinity from St. Louis University in 1971 and ordained Priest in May of that same

As a monk, served the monastic community in various capacities, viz. Sub prior, Prior, Novice Master Formation Director, Procurator (treasurer) and member, of the Senior Council. In ministries of St. Bernard, taught theology at St. Bernard College/ Southern Benedictine College 1971-1979, served as chaplain at Sacred Heart Monastery, campus ministry at St. Bernard College, Cullman College, Southern Benedictine College, appointed pastor to Sacred Heart Parish (Cullman) 1986-1995, appointed member of Presbyterial Council of Diocese of Birmingham, elected Ninth Abbot of St. Bernard Abbey in May 1995, served in that capacity until retirement from that Office in July 2019. In retirement has served as Spiritual Director and Confessor.

Beginning October 2021 will serve as Pastor of St. Michael Parish, St. Florian, Alabama, the proto-parish of St. Vincent Archabbey/St. Bernard Abbey in Alabama.

Abbot Cletus is a Golden Jubilarian of profession as a monk and priest; a Silver Jubilarian as Abbot.

When Archabbot Boniface Wimmer founded the American-Cassinese Congregation, there were two kinds of work he especially encouraged for his monks, viz., the establishment of schools and work in pastoral ministry. When St. Bernard Abbey was founded in 1891, these were his marching orders to our monks. Within a year, our founding fathers and brothers had established a school and were serving in parishes throughout north Alabama.

Over the years, monks of St. Bernard have served in parishes in Alabama, Mississippi, Georgia, Florida, Tennessee, Kentucky, Virginia and Ohio. Our schools have included a grade school, a middle school, a high school, a Junior College, a 4-year Liberal Arts College and a 4-year School of Theology.

Fr. Luke Fazi, O.S.B., of happy memory, is a classic example of a St. Bernard monk who dedicated himself to these ministries for over fifty years. Many of us remember him as our high school principal, our Latin teacher, our coach, our Athletic Director and the list goes on. Regularly, he accepted assignments at parishes throughout the southeast and he especially enjoyed assignments in Memphis, his home

As we close our 130th Anniversary, I thank God for the dedicated service given by Fr. Luke and all the monks who have given their lives to the "Ora et Labora" Benedictine way of life. In our day, I'm grateful for the monks who work in the various ministries we have here on our campus. Many of these same monks go out on weekend assignments to celebrate Mass and administer the sacraments in many parishes throughout the Southeast.

I'm also grateful to the large number of dedicated men and women who make up the St. Bernard family and who work along side of the monks. These include the faculty and staff of our school, the workers in our Grotto, Retreat Center, Physical Plant, Kitchen, Farm and those who clean and maintain our campus. Another addition to our St. Bernard family is the host of volunteers and Benedictine Oblates who answer the call whenever there's a need.


Of major importance to our St.

After the college at St. Bernard closed, he taught sciences at St. Augustine College, Nassau Bahamas 1979-1980. He returned to St. Bernard to open the St. Bernard Retreat Center in 1981. He served on the Diocesan School Board for a number of terms beginning in 1979

At various times, he has served the monastic community in the formation program, on the senior council, as the chapter and senior council secretary, and in the business office. He was the first non-priest to be appointed Sub-prior of the Abbey by Abbot Hillary Dreaper. Over the years he has enjoyed working on the campus grounds and landscaping, planting a number of trees on campus. He was a member of the planning committee for the opening of St. Bernard Prep School 1983. When St. Bernard Prep School opened in 1984, he taught Biology and Physics in the Prep School 1984-2018. He was appointed the Treasurer (Procurator) for St. Bernard Abbey 2019 and serves in that position at present.






