Professional Development Days Held at St. Bernard

In preparation for the 2022-23 Academic Year at St. Bernard Prep, all teachers and staff members spent three days in meetings, professional development, and their classrooms anticipating the arrival of 130 plus students.

Cullman's nationally known speaker, Jenny Nolen, traveled from her home in Hattiesburg, Mississippi to deliver a fun loving, funny message recanting her life story titled "Lessons from an Invisible Child."

Nolen finds plenty of humor in everyday living, and told those in attendance that sometimes all we have to do is sit back, observe and listen. However, when it comes to children, adult roles must change to becoming caring, loving, selfless adults.

While her young life experiences were less than

perfect, Nolen experienced trauma and hard knocks that most couldn't imagine. From living in a children's home, and returning to a home with a mom who suffered physically and mentally, Nolen found humor as a way to overcome her many obstacles. She shared several examples of people in her life who had a great impact on her.

There are many ways to influence young minds by just being observant. Teachers have a special gift and can detect when something is going on with a child just simply by listening. "You impact the life of each child by what you say, what you do, what you wear, and how you respond."

"Time is precious and it carries a sense of urgency in everything we do," Nolen

said. "We can't waste one minute doing anything other than helping them."

The presentation touched on the role of social media in the lives of children. Often children/students share everything digitally, which has the potential for many challenges. When mishaps happen in this digital world, it may have a negative impact on our children and their sense of worth. Social media interactions create digital footprints and must be monitored by loving and caring adults. "Be role models for students by being leaders through faith and scholarship.

Following the presentation everyone gathered in the Abbey Church for Mass. Lunch was served in the Dining Hall, followed by

group sessions dealing with bullying, harassment and rerecruiting students.

Thursday's sessions included topics of student discipline, role of leadership teams, volunteerism, student/teacher relations and mandatory reporting. Other housekeeping reviews

included the faculty/staff handbook, and emergency "red bag" procedures.

Jim Miller, CEO and President, Fr. Joel Martin, OSB presided over the meetings.

The students arrived on Sunday, August 14 and classes began on Monday morning.

Ordination Mass of Fr. Dominic Lee, O.S.B.

On Saturday, August 6th, the Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord, Father Dominic Lee, O.S.B, a Benedictine monk of St. Bernard Abbey, was ordained to the Sacred Priesthood by the Most Reverend Steven J. Raica, J.C.D., Bishop of Birmingham in Alabama. Abbot Marcus Voss, O.S.B. and the monks of St. Bernard Abbey were pleased to welcome Bishop Raica, the family of Father Dominic, and the many guests to the festive ordination in the St. Bernard Abbey Church. Guests for the ordination included visiting Benedictine monks, priests and deacons of the Diocese of Birmingham, religious sisters, and many lay faithful, especially from the Huntsville area, from which Father Dominic hails. After the liturgy, a celebratory banquet was held in the Dining Hall, at which Father Dominic greeted the joyous crowd and imparted First Blessings.

The next day, Sunday, August 7, 2022, Father Dominic celebrated his Solemn Mass of Thanksgiving in the Abbey Church. He was assisted at his First Mass by two monk-deacons of St. Bernard Abbey, with whom Father Dominic entered the monastery: Brother Paschal and Brother Pachomius. The homily was given by the Very Reverend Kevin M. Bazzel, J.C.L., who spoke about the relationship between Father Dominic's monastic and priestly vocations. Father Bazzel preached powerfully, saying, "Seen in this light, when a monk is ordained a priest, rather than it being a 'promotion' of the particular monk, it is an added obligation to spend his life directed toward the salvation of the souls of his brothers. He does this certainly by offering the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass for the community, by hearing the confessions of his confreres, and by offering prayers and other sacrifices for the brethren.


Father Dominic is the third of six children of Mr. and Mrs. Davin and Janet Lee, of Huntsville, Alabama. He was homeschooled under the former Saint Peter's Academy and upon graduation began a year-long discernment process that eventually led him to Saint Bernard Abbey. He entered the monastery in 2014 at the age of 19. Interestingly, Father Dominic's sister, Sister Maria Raphaelle, O.S.B., had entered the Benedictine Abbey of St. Walburga in Virginia Dale, Colorado the year prior. She is now a solemnly professed Benedictine nun of that Abbey. After making his Simple Profession of Vows on August 15th, 2015, Father Dominic began undergraduate studies at Belmont Abbey College in North Carolina. He professed Solemn Vows on August 6th, 2018 and graduated a few months later from Belmont Abbey College with a Bachelor of Arts degree in both Mathematics and Philosophy. Father Dominic began studying Theology in Rome, Italy at the Pontifical Benedictine University of Sant'Anselmo in 2019. He completed his Baccalaureate of Sacred Theology just before his recent ordination.

In addition to exercising his priestly ministry at the monastery and at parishes on an ad hoc basis, Father Dominic will be taking up the duty of Master of Junior Monks in the monastery and Assistant Teacher at Saint Bernard Preparatory School.

Homily given at the Ordination Mass of Fr. Dominic Lee, O.S.B. by Very Reverend Kevin M. Bazzel, JCL, Vicar General and Moderator of the Curia of the Diocese of Birmingham.

The monk provides a preeminent example of the exhortation of our Lord in today's Gospel, "Do not be afraid any longer, little flock, for your Father is pleased to give you the kingdom. Sell your belongings and give alms. Provide money bags for yourselves that do not wear out, an inexhaustible treasure in heaven that no thief can reach nor moth destroy. For where your treasure is, there also will your heart be."

As Saint John Paul II said in his exhortation *Vita consacrata*, "In the consecrated life, then, it is not only a matter of following Christ with one's whole heart, of loving him "more than father or mother, more than son or daughter" (cf. Mt 10:37) — for this is required of every disciple — but of living and expressing this by conforming one's whole existence to Christ in an all-encompassing commitment which foreshadows the eschatological perfection..." (§16)

Therefore, the life of the monk is meant to manifest to the people of God faith in and hope for the full possession of the Kingdom of Heaven. As we heard in our second reading, "Faith is the realization of what is hoped for and evidence of things not seen." It is not hyperbole to say that the vocation of the monk is to be "evidence of things not seen" – like the Kingdom of Heaven. By showing the world how to live in the world without being worldly, the

monk proclaims that there is a greater world to come. And, by conforming his whole existence to Christ – to become, we might say, an image of Christ – the monk is called to be evidence to the world of the continued presence of Christ among us.

However, Father Dominic, now you are also a priest, and a priest is configured in a profound way to Christ crucified and risen. As you vest yourself with the white alb for the celebration of Holy Mass, everyone, including yourself, is reminded of the configuration of your soul to Christ, who is now risen from the dead and presiding at the Eternal Mass in Heaven.

The stole is placed over the alb, as a reminder that the Lord first laid down his life for his people. While the monastic vocation does not entail in its essence the care of a particular flock, though monks may be assigned as pastors of souls, the vestments of a priest remind you of the fact that you are called to lay down your life for the salvation of your brothers in view of the Resurrection to come.

And over both of these is the chasuble, the sign of charity. Charity is loving God above all things *for his own sake*, and loving our neighbor as ourselves, for the love of God – a complete selfless and self-giving love.

Two Monks Advance to Juniorate at St. Bernard Abbey

The adventure continues for two of St. Bernard's monks-in-formation. Having completed their novitiate year, Brs. Joseph and Augustine entered into the next leg of their formation journey: the three-year

juniorate program.

A ceremony held August 20, 2022, the Solemnity of St. Bernard of Clairvaux, marked the transition. Ascending the altar with their handwritten vows documents, the two brothers took time-limited vows of stability, obedience and "conversatio morum" – a hard-to-translate Latin phrase that refers to the day-to-day endeavor of striving after monastic ideals.

At St. Bernard, becoming a monk is a four-and-a-half-year process. At the junior

stage, the brothers' vows are still temporary. Both monks will continue discerning their vocations as the threeyear juniorate program progresses. If all goes well, they will go on to take solemn (lifelong) vows when their simple vows expire in 2025.

During the vows ceremony, Abbot Marcus placed scapulars over the two brothers' shoulders and buttoned on their new capuches (monastic hoods). The capuche is a symbolic reminder that the path to the Kingdom of God leads along a straight and narrow road. The scapular, on the other hand, calls to mind Matthew 11:30: "My yoke is easy and my burden is

Therefore it is evident that only with the theological virtue of charity may a priest ever attempt to fulfill his mission - to act in the person of Christ, laying down his life for the people of God and being raised up to the glories of the Altar in Heaven.

Yet, underneath all of this is your monastic habit – the sign of, and a source of grace for, the stable foundation of your vowed life. Your monastic habit is the symbol of the stable foundation of the meaning and purpose of your life. The habit is not a mere piece of clothing, but an external sign of the vows you made on the day of your profession.

Even more, the monastic habit is a sacramental, through which you may receive actual graces for the living out of the life to which you were called – to be an image of Christ on earth. An image of Christ, who was completely obedient to the Father's will. An image of Christ, who made the world his home for the span of His earthly life. An image of Christ, who was in no need of conversion, but Who came to make it possible for us to experience the joys of the conversion of our

Your ordination to the priesthood, therefore, does not perfect your monastic vocation, but qualifies it. Your acceptance of your vocation was already perfected at the moment you took your solemn vows of stability, obedience and conversion of life through the Benedictine Rule. The vocation of a monk is to excel in perfecting the life of Christ - to become an image of Christ Himself to the world – through the graces received from the faithful living of out of the vows he has made.

Seen in this light, when a monk is ordained a priest, rather than it being a "promotion" of the particular monk, it is an added obligation to spend his life directed toward the salvation of the souls of his brothers. He does this certainly by offering the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass for the community, by hearing the confessions of his confreres, and by offering prayers and other sacrifices for the brethren.

Additionally, in being attentive to the labors entrusted to him by the Abbot for the good of the community, the monk who has been ordained a priest fulfills all his duties in the person of Christ. Therefore, the monk who is ordained a priest has an even greater obligation to ensure that the manner of the carrying out of his daily work reflects who he is interiorly – an alter

So, Father Dominic, yesterday you began your new life as a monk and as a priest. As one who is called to be an image of Christ while being another Christ.

An image of Christ while being another Christ. This might sound redundant. Nevertheless, you must remember that, because of the indelible mark placed on your soul through priestly ordination, you will be another Christ for all eternity. But this indelible mark does not guarantee that you will be an image of Christ even for a

Seen this way, one could say that you cannot have the perfection of your priestly life without the perfection of your monastic life. Therefore, ordination to the Priesthood gives you an even greater impetus to be more faithful to the heart of your vocation from God – your monastic vows.

Therefore, we pray today, that through the intercession of Saint Benedict, Saint Bernard, Saint Dominic, and Saint John Vianney, that you may continue to grow in perfection as a monk, so that your life will manifest to all of us the beauty of one who is called to be an image of Christ while being another Christ.

Christ, Who was obedient to the Father's will, Who made His home among us, and who made it possible for us to have conversion of our lives.

Christ, Who selflessly laid down His life for us, so that we might inherit the Kingdom of Heaven.

Early on in formation, the monks of St. Bernard are encouraged to brainstorm ways that they might use their unique, God-given talents and skills for the good of the monastery. To this end, monks-inthe-making consult with their confreres and meet with their spiritual advisors, who help them discover how God might be calling them to contribute to the monastery's work life.

Once a novice monk comes up with some viable ideas, he submits his list of proposals to the abbot, who prayerfully decides what the novice's initial role will be when he becomes a junior. Many monks go on to attend college during their juniorate, or use the time to learn some kind of trade.

Whatever plan is decided in the juniorate is by no means set in stone. The rule of life that Benedictine monks follow is often praised for its flexibility and the way in which it enables the full actualization of human potential. The average Benedictine monk takes on a rich and fulfilling variety of different jobs and responsibilities as his career progresses.

Br. Joseph plans on learning the art of carpentry during his juniorate while also serving as the monastery's beekeeper.

'Right now I'm working on learning how to make Benedictine crosses for the grotto gift store. It'll probably be a few years before we'll be ready to resume selling honey again, but I'm looking forward to doing that as well.'

Meanwhile, Br. Augustine will be helping out at the administration office as an Assistant to the Director of Development.

"It feels good to be able to contribute, doing work for the monastery that I'm already very familiar with doing," Br. Augustine said. "It's definitely a blessing that this position opened up at just the right time and that I can come in and contribute right away.'

St. Bernard Abbey is home to 27 monks. Its ministries consist of Saint Bernard Preparatory School, Ave Maria Grotto, St. Bernard Retreat Center, and pastoral ministries. For more information, visit stbernardabbey.com.

St. Bernard Students Monitor Ecosystem

St. Bernard Prep Environmental Science students recently went into the woods to begin a study of two 33x33 ft. square plots in a forested section on the St. Bernard campus. Within the plots, the students were to identify the different types of trees and other vegetation as well as small wildlife and insects that inhabit each plot.

This task was accomplished through the use of several apps the students installed on their smart phones which allowed them to photograph specimens in the field. The app then identified the specimens by giving both a common name and a scientific name. Students made accurate measurements of the location of each species of vegetation within the plots. In addition, they noted any downed tree limbs that were in the process of decay.

These tasks were completed in order to make a site map of their plots. Soil samples were taken in several different places within each plot and will be analyzed to determine soil qualities. The students made video recordings of the sites to collect visual data as well as auditory data. They also captured various birds singing and a cicada symphony in progress.

Upon rolling over a decaying log, several students were amazed at the numerous inhabitants who had taken up residence under its shelter. Bruna Parolin, an international student from Brazil, was curious to find out about the spiders with the very long legs that went scurrying in all

directions. "Those are Daddy- Long-Legs," Emily Garcia-Cerna informed her. " They look scary, but they won't hurt you."

The students will monitor these sites throughout the school year to note any changes in vegetation, fungi presence, increases or decreases in wildlife, animal tracks, rainfall amounts, depth of fall leaf layers and soil analyses.

The goal of this project is for the students to get a better understanding of the components that make up this ecosystem and the interconnectedness of life.


While returning from the site, the students were delighted to spot a deer as it grazed a mere fifty yards away. "Anytime we can get high school students out into nature and excited about the natural world, is a win in my book and showing them how their smart phone can be used as a scientific tool is an added bonus," remarked instructor Martha

of "5" on each of them."


Students like Ethan are a teacher's dream.

"Camp here for me were some of the happiest times of my life," he said. "Being able to have a little vacation with loving, caring people. And, what Mr. Arndt does here is amazing.







Classical Guitarist to Perform at St. Bernard

American classical guitarist, Giovanni De Chiaro, will be performing a benefit concert for Saint Bernard Preparatory School in the Abbey Church on Sunday, September 25, at 7 p.m.

Making his debut in 1976 in Carnegie Hall, one of the ultimate badges of musical honor, De Chiaro gave a performance that brought a rave notice from the New York Times. At that moment, De Chiaro launched a career of distinction that saw him return to Carnegie Hall at various

times to present six more solo recitals. Most recently, he performed there with the Mississippi Guitar Quartet, an ensemble he established. John De Chiaro has concertized throughout the United States, South America, Canada, Europe and Mexico and has performed for Pope John Paul II at the Vatican in Rome.

Mr. De Chiaro is a recording artist for Centaur Records in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. He recorded his guitar transcriptions of the complete works of Scott Joplin, two Christmas CDs, a Broadway Collection and a Wedding Album. His latest release, entitled "*Melodie d'Amore*," features his guitar transcriptions of familiar piano masterpieces from the Romantic Period.

Published extensively with the Willis Music Publishing Company, he has released four anthologies of his transcriptions with Mel Bay Publications. Mr. De Chiaro has recorded two nationally televised programs for PBS, which have won top honors at several national

and international film festivals. He was also featured on the National Public Radio program "All Things Considered," discussing and performing several of his Scott Joplin transcriptions. His recordings are regularly featured on the NPR programs "Classical Guitar Alive," and "Performance Today."

With the Recordings and Publication of his Classical Guitar Transcriptions of the Complete Works of Scott Joplin, De Chiaro received the *Global Music Award for Outstanding Achievement*, and he received that same distinction for his recording of the *Concierto De Chiaro* with the London Symphony, and the "Best Instrumentalist Award," as well.

Mr. De Chiaro retired as Professor of Guitar at the University of Southern Mississippi in Hattiesburg, Mississippi, having served there for twenty-five years. He currently resides in Hartselle, Alabama and teaches at the University of North Alabama in Florence.

For De Chiaro, attending Mass at St. Bernard Abbey in Cullman is a special blessing. "I love the atmosphere at St. Bernard. There is nothing like the acoustics of singing and playing in the Abbey

Church."

Following the concert, a "love offering" with be collected with proceeds benefiting St. Bernard Preparatory School. A meet-and-greet with the artist will be held in the Brahma Room of St. Bernard Dining Hall, complete with refreshments.
