


St. Bernard Prep Honors Senior Class


Dickerson said that moment is extremely important in our Catholic faith and beliefs. "These young women executed the scene with sincerity and intention. It was beautiful!"

St. Bernard Monks Rolling Out Cookies

Two years ago, Fr. Bede Marcy, St. Bernard Dining Hall Director, and Br. Christopher McBride decided to try their hands at baking cookies. It didn't take long for a few batches of their fresh-baked goodness to grow into an in-demand cookie business.

The new venture turned out to be an all-day affair. In order to roll out cookies for customers, the monks had to prepare dough in the early mornings, cut out cookies in the afternoon and check in on the process throughout the day.

Mixing a single batch of cookie dough typically takes 20 to 45 minutes, depending on the type. Then there's the boxing, which requires an additional 30 to 45 minutes. The rest of the procedure—which involves dividing, weighing, panning and baking the cookies—can consume up to two entire work days.

Keeping up with all this while still managing to attend Mass and Divine Office prayers turned out to be impractical. With these concerns in mind, the monks decided to look into purchasing a cookie depositor. If they could acquire one, it would cut three hours of work out of their daily schedules.

Fr. Bede met with the Senior Council of St. Bernard Abbey to discuss the possibility of using revenue from cookie sales to pay for the new equipment.

"The limiting factor on sales is how many boxes we can actually produce to cover each of these areas. We have yet to meet demand for grotto, groups, parishes, etc.," Fr. Bede said.

After prayer and consideration, the council approved the request. A cookie depositor has been installed in the Abbey Kitchen, eliminating the need for rolling and cutting cookies. The high tech machine with its touch screen design can produce 24 commercial baking pans with 48 cookies at a time, turning 30 pounds' worth of cookie dough into finished

product.

The monks plan to use their newly expanded capabilities to make their gingerbread, chocolate chip, pfeffernuse, lemon drop, and shortbread cookies available to local farmer's markets and festivals soon, along with their popular Bernard's Best Bread.

Br. Christopher said, "[The cookie depositor] has been a wonderful addition to have in the bakery. Every once in a while it churns out

a crumbled cookie, but when that happens we always have sufficient taste testers standing by for careful quality control."

"There were several days where we expanded the event to include live musical performances, food trucks, kids' rides around St. Bernard's campus and horse-drawn wagon rides along a beautiful decorated path in the woods. Joseph's labor of love and left realizing how small acts of love, no matter how seemingly insignificant, can be so fruitful for years to come."

However, we were unsure of the timeline. After research, we found that he took the oath two months before the deadline and was qualified."

"As we spoke to the representative, I made the comment that he barely made the cut by only two months. He stared me down and said 'He took the oath, he served.""


He concluded by thanking veterans, and sharing this quote: "To those who served, freedom has a taste that the protected will never understand."
