## **SBP** Receives TVA Grant

St. Bernard Preparatory School in Cullman, AL was recently awarded a \$5,000 grant as part of a \$1 Million Dollar STEM grant program from TVA (Tennessee Valley Authority) to develop science, technology, engineering, and math education projects across the Tennessee Valley.

STEM is an educational program that aims to integrate traditional pedagogy and real-world applications, providing for contemporarily structured learning environments. To facilitate in-depth understanding, STEM students apply classroom

knowledge to various kinds of handson projects. Collaborating together in groups, students are able to develop and assess their hypotheses through discussion and problem-solving.

The grant will give St. Bernard students the opportunity to investigate a small stream and a tributary of Eight-Mile Creek, located on the school campus, as a viable community source of potable water. They'll also test it to see if it might be usable as a recreational resource for swimming and fishing. Math

(Continued from Page 1) instructors Kim Whaley and Chanda Dabbs, in collaboration with Chemistry and Biology instructors, Shelly Perry and Martha Wells, worked together to create the plan.

Chemistry students will test the water quality by testing temperature, pH, dissolved oxygen, nitrites, and phosphates in water samples. At the same time, math students will test the water by using calculus to find the average amount of water flowing through the stream per day and per month. Likewise, biology students will test for coliform bacteria, depth visibility and the presence or absence of macroinvertebrates to assess water quality and clarity.

Students will conduct their tests on a bi-weekly basis. They'll also record, analyze and compare data to EPA guidelines to determine water's viability for community use. By analyzing the data and interpreting the results, students will be led to make connections between the actions of a community and the subsequent impact on their local water environment.

As the project progresses, the students will become more and more familiar with how chemistry, biology, environmental science, and math concepts learned in class can be used in the real world. They will also learn how to follow correct experimental procedures, interpret and evaluate the obtained data, and look for evidence of the source of pollutants. Additionally, they'll use the Riemann Sum formula and accumulation functions to calculate the volume of the water in the stream. Once they estimate the quantity of the water, they'll be able to determine what size community the water supply will maintain. Furthermore, they will be introduced to other environmental science concepts such as watershed, runoff and the implications of eutrophication (a process causing increased algae growth) due to increased nutrient levels. Perhaps most importantly, they'll realize the importance of being good stewards of our waterways.

Whaley said that students will assess their findings by answering lab questions. In addition to writing and balancing equations, they'll also be tasked with preparing a report for a fictitious supervisor. As they prepare the report, they will interpret and evaluate test data against current standards for our area, and draw conclusions as to the origin of any contaminants that they find in their water samples.

"Students will be evaluated on presentations, vocabulary and pre-lab questions, a lab sheet with lab analysis questions thoughtfully and accurately answered, and a written report assessed for writing skills, strength of argument, and supporting evidence," Whaley said.

"TVA is focused on supporting clean-energy technologies and STEM education that helps today's students develop the skills needed to work in these careers," said Jeannette Mills, TVA executive vice president, and chief external relations officer. "Innovation is the key to success, and it's inspiring to contribute to the next generation's visionaries."

## lew Artwork Donated

St. Bernard Prep has been gifted a beautiful piece of handcrafted artwork with a very meaningful symbol - the Benedictine

A few months ago Southern Heritage Restoration owner, Paul Moss, was working in his shop when a couple walked in to inquire about a custom made table. As the couple discussed their table, they indicated a desire to create a special piece of art for the Dining Hall of St. Bernard Abbey and School. With a design in hand, they told Moss they would like to have it made of purpleheart — a durable, rare type of wood from Southeast Asia — but thought it likely impossible. Purpleheart wood is known to be one of the hardiest and sturdiest types of wood in the world.

The couple presented Moss a pamphlet with the St. Bernard logo and asked if one could be made to measure five feet tall and four feet wide. "Little did they know I had just completed a table made out of purple heart, and I told them I sure could," Moss

Southern Heritage Restoration specializes in reclaiming high quality wood from old barns, antique furniture, and other structures. Moss had on hand several reclaimed boards that were taken from an old lowboy military trailer. We may never know exactly where this wood originated or what all it has hauled.

"We put a lot of work in this piece, and I can't thank my guys enough for all of their help," stated Paul. "We first created a 5' x 4' square and used a friend's wood router machine to cut out. Then we brought it back to the shop to take care of the rest. "Several of the boards contained holes," Moss said, "We filled the boards with epoxy so that we could sand it, router it out, and sand it again. Once it was sanded to our perfection, we

coated it with five coats of polyurethane."

The artwork was delivered to the school, put in place and covered to await its formal presentation. Prior to the unveiling, the St. Bernard Prep band played Mardi Gras music to celebrate Fat Tuesday, the day before Ash Wednesday. All gathered in the Dining Hall to see the work unveiled. The ceremony itself began with a scripture reading from St. Paul's Epistle to the Colossians, followed by a solemn prayer and a blessing.

Abbot Marcus Voss, O.S.B. and St. Bernard Prep CEO Jim Miller presided over the unveiling of the artwork for St. Bernard in the Dining Hall. The anonymous donors designed the gift specifically for the front entrance wall, as it is the place where students and guests gather to eat meals. As well, the location often serves as a stage for events held by the Abbey and school, including daily breaks during the school day.

"This artwork combines the seal of the school and the abbey," Abbot Marcus said. "It's presented with the symbol of salvation (the Cross) that always reminds us of the love of the Lord." As Abbot Marcus blessed the artwork he prayed these words, "May the sprinkling of this holy water remind all of us of our life in Christ that began at our baptism.'

Miller thanked all the benefactors involved in the donation of the artwork, especially Paul Moss, Mike Roberts, Joel Williams, Cyle Lutz and Ethan Ellison -- the artists behind the work. "We are so grateful for this beautiful addition to our school," Miller said. "It will be a legacy piece for future generations of St. Bernard students to enjoy.

## Meeting of Benedictine Abbots and Prioresses Held at St. Bernard

A joint meeting of Benedictine Abbots and Prioresses was held at the Byre Conference Center of St. Bernard Abbey in Cullman, AL. on the weekend of February 3, 2023. The Prioresses were hosted by the Benedictine Sisters of Sacred Heart Monastery, while the Abbots were welcomed by the monks of St. Bernard Abbey. Twenty-seven Abbots and forty-four Prioresses from Central America, the United States and Canada gathered to attend conferences on health care issues and how best to serve the needs of the sick and the elderly.

St. Benedict, the founder of the Benedictine tradition, included specific sections of the Benedictine Rule of Life on the care of the sick. Concern for implementing his admonitions in Benedictine life today, especially in care of the sick and elderly, was the focus of the presentations.


Rev. Gregory Polan, O.S.B., the Abbot Primate and representative of Benedictines worldwide, opened the first conference and gave a report on Benedictine communities around the world. He said, "We need to keep in mind that we are international. We are multicultural and many things are beginning to pick-up after the heavy impact of the pandemic." He spoke at length about Benedictine life around the world and concluded by giving a report about Sant'Anselmo, the Benedictine international school located in Rome,

Italy.

On Saturday, February 4th, Brother John Mark Falkenhain, O.S.B., a licensed psychologist and a member of the faculty at St. Meinrad Seminary, discussed mental health concerns in society today. He delineated the four main areas of psychological functioning, including affect, behavior, cognition and social functioning. He then described the specific problems and disorders present within each of these areas, particularly in an aging population.

Sr. Esther Fangman, O.S.B., Prioress of Mount St. Scholastica Monastery in Atchison, KS., and her staff spoke on Sunday, February 5th, about the care of those who suffer from chronic illness and ways in which to provide for them with long-term care. Special attention was given to Alzheimer's disease, depression and heart disease.

"It was good to have the Abbots and Prioresses join us at St. Bernard," said Abbot Marcus Voss. "Most of our monasteries have infirmaries, as prescribed by St. Benedict, and provide for the infirm members of our communities. It was extremely helpful to have the opportunity to discuss how best to care for them." In addition, Abbot Marcus said, "It was an honor to have the leaders of other Benedictine monasteries at St. Bernard. It makes us aware of the richness of our Benedictine tradition and the worldwide community we share."






